

Expected Census Results in 2020 (Revision for actual census below)

Every 10 years, in the United States there is a census. The results of the people count revise the number of seats each state has in the House of Representatives. The number of seats in the House plus the two Senate seats are the electoral vote for each state. It is becoming more difficult to get an accurate count of people due to immigration and homeless. Based upon the anticipated results, the following changes are expected in the House.

Those results mean 8 states will gain 16 seats and 13 states will lose 16 seats.

All numbers are estimates; the actual results may be +/- 1 seat.

These results will affect the 2020 electoral vote.

If this count was used in the 2016 election, the result would have been within 2 votes.

The states will have to redistrict House seats before the 2022 election.

There are guidelines for how many people can be in a given House district.

Swing States are in **Green**

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The actual results were published on April 26, 2021.
They are quite different than the expected results.
California lost 1 seat instead of gaining 3 seats.
Texas gained 2 seats instead of gaining 5 seats.
No other state gained or lost more than one seat.
There are some questions about the accuracy of the count.
Were immigrants accurately counted?
